A home at university



1 A home at university

Our annual scholarship scheme provides a year-round, free, home at university for up to 3 years. Scholarship students are estranged from their family or have had experience of the UK children's social care system. For young people from this background, Higher Education is life changing, but far too few reach university, and far too many end up leaving before they've got their degree.

Independent research from Jisc shows that our scholarship makes a difference; the students that we support progress, and achieve good degrees, close to students from more typical backgrounds, and at significantly better rates than their peers. We're doing our bit to close the gap and want all care experienced and estranged young people to get the same opportunity.

191

students were on the scholarship during the 23/24 academic year with **38** graduating in Summer 2024.

96

new students joined the scholarship in August 2024 and we're grateful to UniKitOut, Harford Trust, and many small individual donors, for funding our welcome packs that turn an empty student room into a personal and cosy home.

813

scholarships have been awarded since we were founded in 2012.

We're currently piloting 3 year co-funded scholarships with:

Care experienced and estranged young people are a minority in the wider UK student population and can often feel isolated or that they don't belong. We're helping them get connected to one another – socially as well as for common purpose – to feel united by a sense of community.

The All of Us Community is facilitated by the Unite Foundation but **is run by and for** students to provide online events and in-person meetups, plus resources for any relevant student in the UK.

the online All of Us
Community space.

The All of Us small grants scheme enabled **11** activities with **143** participants in 23/24 – another **5** have taken place since then, including one gathering on Christmas Day. **16** students have taken on leadership roles to run activities or act as 'Community Catalysts' to keep the student space responsive and relevant.

4,500

All of Us postcards have been shared with universities and charities to raise awareness that the Community offers a welcoming haven.

We've created an HE Peer Network so that university professionals can support one another, and All of Us, to prosper locally, regionally and nationally.

All of Us students have helped shape national policy by feeding into the last Government's Review of Children's Social Care; they also held a focus group to input into the (December '24) **Social Market Foundation report on Care and Learning in Higher Education**. We're creating space for students that are passionate for change and are committed to ensuring their lived experiences reach decision makers.

The **All of Us flag** was co-created by estranged and care experienced students and represents the diversity of community, flanked by the symbol of equality. Recognition of the flag is growing and we're ambitious that in future it will 'mark the spot' for Community activity in every university in the UK.

Removing roadblocks

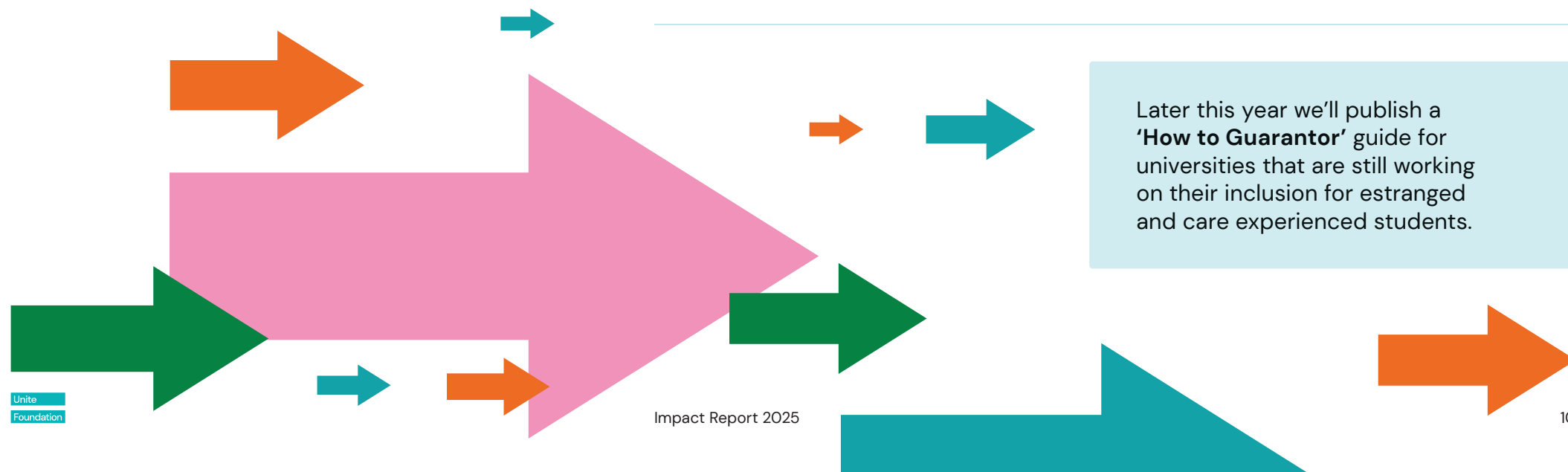

We've been active on the issue of rent guarantors for some time. Students from a care or estranged background rarely have someone to turn to that can sign up for that role, and the need to have a rent guarantor typically crops up late in a tenancy process catching students unawares.

Through our '[How to Guarantor](#)' programme we're challenging and supporting universities to:

Have clear student-facing information on rent guarantors. Our 23/24 audit of universities showed an **8% increase** of websites with suitable content – a great start but with more progress to make. We'll be auditing again in summer '25 to mark the next advance from the current baseline of 45%.

Provide a cost-free solution to the rent guarantor issue. This could be an in-house scheme, partnering with a commercial provider, or championing tenancies without guarantors. In 2025 our **webinar series** is offering universities information and practical help to make this a reality.
